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Letter from the Chairman of the Board and President/CEO

2006 was another successful year for us here at CCEDC. Staff closed more loans, initiated more projects, and secured more external funding than ever before. At this time, we are delighted to acknowledge the work of the Council staff, their tremendous skills and abilities, and their professional expertise par excellence. They are the most positive, detail-oriented, stick-to-the-task-at-hand folks you will ever meet!

Highlights of the Year:

- SBA staff closed 26 loans valued at \$17.2 million (up from \$14.077 million in 2005). For the 8th year, they led the Greater Philadelphia SBA District in productivity.
- Proposal development staff acquired \$20.788 million in external grants from 35 funding proposals (out of 40 submitted). Eleven (11) of the grant awards benefited conduit clients.
- The agricultural economic development staff assisted PAgrows clients to secure 29 loans valued at \$11.7 million.
- CCEDC secured \$680,831 in funding to support workforce and technology development initiatives.
- CCEDC completed its fourth year of administering the Self Employment Assistance Program. Of the 37 persons who entered the training in 2005-06, 28 completed the courses and 20 businesses were started.

What are the prospects for 2007? For one, with the hiring of former Chester County Department of Community Development Executive Director Tom McIntyre, we anticipate providing increased services to the 73 municipalities in the county.

Projects in Downingtown, Oxford, Kennett Square and West Chester Boroughs are at the top of the agenda.

Other high profile efforts of the Council will include the PA Grows program; which renders development services to farmers and the agriculture industry; the industry partnerships for IT, BioScience, and Healthcare, respectively; the Chester County Public Safety Training Facility (PSTF); and the Chester County Keystone Innovation Zone (KIZ), a collaboration with 24 partnering organizations.

Meanwhile, work progresses on adding 4,325 SF to the Council building in Eagleview Corporate Center. This will allow us to reallocate office and meeting space and better facilitate the services of our valued on-site partners such as PA CareerLink, Ben Franklin Technology Partners, Delaware Valley Industrial Resource Center (DVIRC), PECO Energy, Community First Fund, and the Chester County Alliance.

Lastly, we remain truly appreciative for the ongoing input and integral involvement of the 48 members of the Board of Directors, and our 256 member companies in guiding and sustaining the work of the Council.

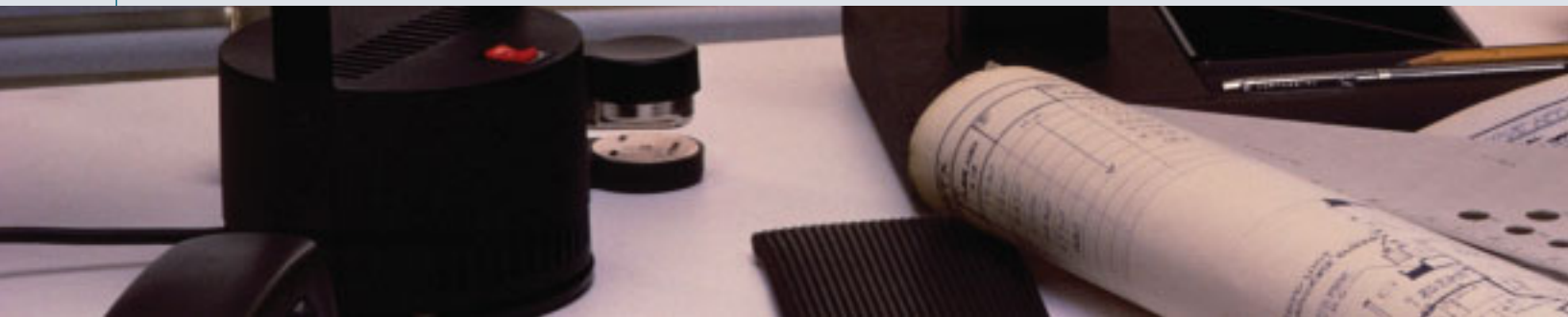


CCEDC Signs Agreement of Sale for Public Safety Training Facility Site

PECO Energy has agreed-in-principle to sell a 70-acre property located in South Coatesville Borough and East Fallowfield Township to the Chester County Economic Development Council (CCEDC). The site will become the future home for the new Chester County Public Safety Training Facility (PSTF).

The facility, to be constructed over four (4) years at an estimated cost of \$37 million, will train the 5,000-plus first responders including fire, police

and emergency medical service personnel who live and work in Chester County. Presently, no such facility exists making it necessary for first responders to travel to training venues in other counties. At buildout, the PSTF will feature a main classroom building and a dozen other training structures including a burn building, drill tower, smoke building, firing range, and tactical village. The Council is managing the facility development on behalf of the Chester County Department of Emergency Services.



Downingtown Revitalization

CCEDC continued to work closely with the Borough of Downingtown to facilitate transit-oriented redevelopment in and around the area occupied by the Downingtown Train Station. When completed, the project will effectively establish the train station as the gateway for entering the Borough from the West, and serve as a catalyst for related economic development in other areas within the Borough.

Throughout 2006, CCEDC personnel participated in talks with Amtrak, industrial owners of adjacent parcels of land, and commercial developers. Also

in 2006, CCEDC helped the Borough obtain a \$100,000 planning grant from the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission. Grant funds will be used to analyze market conditions, transit ridership, redevelopment impacts on the tax base, and other factors relevant to the project.

Revitalization of the train station will promote economic development, encourage re-investment throughout the Borough, and increase local public transit ridership and revenues. CCEDC is pleased to support the Borough's efforts.

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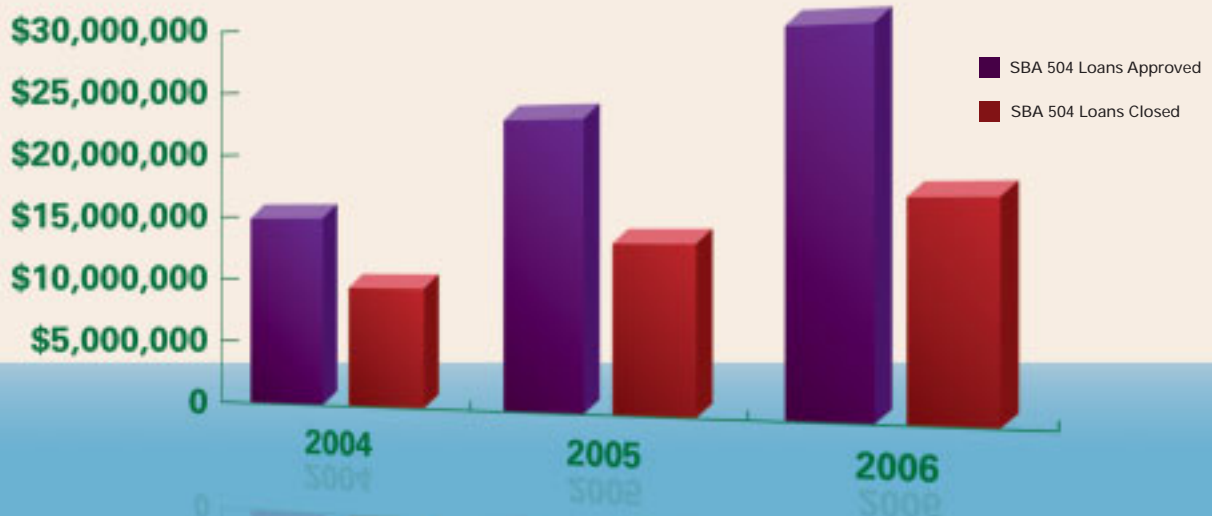
Low Interest Financing

Year In Review

Economic Development Financing continued to be strong in 2006 with increases in loan approvals by 27% and closings by 24%. The Chester County Economic Development Council provides a wide array of loan programs through the State of Pennsylvania. Its affiliate South Eastern Economic Development Company of Pennsylvania ("SeedCo") offers U.S Small Business Administration loans. The purpose of both

organizations is to promote economic growth and community development within the areas served.

For the 8th consecutive year, SeedCo was named the Philadelphia District Certified Development Company of the Year. The award is given to the Certified Development Company closing the largest number of SBA 504 loans.



Tax-Exempt Financing

Under an administrative agreement, CCEDC operates the Chester County Industrial Development Authority (CCIDA), the Central and Western Chester County Industrial Development Authority (C&WCCIDA) and the Uwchlan Township Industrial Development Authority (UTIDA). The

three authorities provide tax-free financing to qualified borrowers which include manufacturers, non-profits and agricultural-based businesses.

During 2006, the IDAs approved six tax-exempt projects for a total of \$51 million.

Loan Highlights

C.T. Bartoli Mushrooms, Inc.

C.T. Bartoli Mushrooms, Inc., is a mushroom grower with 28 doubles (mushroom houses) located in Avondale, PA. In the last year, C.T. Bartoli Mushrooms, Inc., purchased 100 acres in Cochranville, Londonderry Township, Chester County to construct 22 additional mushroom doubles. This property has been preserved as part of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Farmland Preservation Program.

The Peoples Bank of Oxford/National Penn Bank and CCEDC provided the financing to install climate control equipment for those new mushroom houses. Since the new property was preserved from development through the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Farmland Preservation Program, C.T. Bartoli Mushrooms, Inc. was able to get a 1% interest rate reduction from the standard rate for the First Industries Agriculture – Small Business First Program.

Chester County's share of the mushroom industry is significant with the total value of sales at \$266 million and 338 million pounds. Chester County's 65 mushroom farms employ approximately 5,000 and contributed \$2 million to local school taxes in 2006. CCEDC is pleased to support this very important Chester County industry.

JDS Enterprises, Inc.

JDS Enterprises is one of the premier window, glazing, and curtain wall contractors in the region. Marketed under the names of Alpine Architectural Products and JDS Enterprises, primary markets are schools, universities, banks, libraries, commercial and municipal facilities.



Owner Jack Spelman was actively involved in the window contracting industry for over 20 years prior to forming JDS Enterprises in 1993. JDS creates its own products based upon architects' designs and performs the installation servicing Eastern Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware.

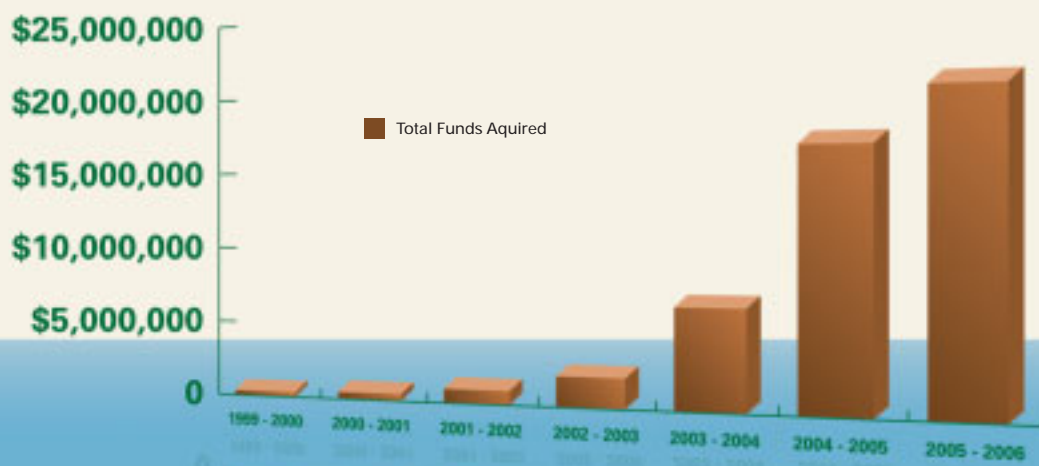
The project financed the acquisition of 208 Phillips Road in the Pickering Creek Industrial Park, Exton, Pennsylvania. SeedCo and Willow Financial provided the financing. Project costs totaled \$2,025 million and resulted in the creation of seven new jobs in Chester County.

Grant Initiatives



In 1999, the CCEDC Board determined that a concerted effort would be made to increase the number of grants the Council obtained annually for economic development. During 1999-2000, CCEDC staff prepared and submitted 13 grant proposals to various federal, state, corporate and foundation sources. Remarkably, a total of 5 (or 38%) of the proposals were funded for a total of \$442,772. From that modest beginning, the process of acquiring external funding through grants grew substantially such that by 2005-2006, the total annual yield had reached over \$20 million.

In the seven-year period of 1999-2006, a total of 136 proposals out of 179 submitted were selected for funding generating a total of \$50.7 million. The money has been utilized exclusively to spur economic development in Chester County through brownfields redevelopment, infrastructure improvement, workforce training, small business lending, agricultural economic development, and downtown revitalization.



International Business Assistance



Chester County International Business Council Go Global Initiative

The PA Department of Community Development, through its Office of International Business Development, has provided funding to CCEDC's International Business Council (CCIBC) to implement a series of programs and events designed to enhance public awareness of international business opportunities and to link companies to local, regional, and state resources. The events are specifically intended to facilitate both exports and/or foreign investment in Pennsylvania.

The initiative has several key partners: Chester County Economic Development Council, PA Department of Community and Economic Development (via OIBD), U.S. Department of Commerce, WorldTrade Center of Greater Philadelphia, and Penn State University – Great Valley.

Several events will be offered in 2007 including breakfast briefing seminars, a global economic outlook breakfast briefing, peer-to-peer education/mentoring forums, and a seminar on the new UCP 600 rules for importing and exporting.

BioScience Partnership

The BioScience Partnership, a partnership between the CCEDC, Life Science Career Alliance (LSCA) and Pennsylvania Bio (PA Bio), is just one Pennsylvania initiative working together to support the growth and development of the life science industry in Southeastern PA. The Partnership is governed by: CCEDC, LSCA, PA Bio, Puresyn, Neose, BioRexis, Emerson, Discovery Labs, Tengion, Locus Pharmaceuticals, Centocor/GBSC, Cephalon, BFTP, DVIRC, Wistar, Collegiate Consortium, MCCC, CCP, Science Center, MVM & Associates, Springhouse, BioAdvance.

The CCEDC secured \$200,000 in grant funds from PA Department of Labor & Industry to support incumbent worker training for the partnership. Additional grants from LSCA and DVIRC are also supporting this initiative.

The BioScience Partnership's mission is to: Grow and develop the Southeastern Pennsylvania region's workforce in biopharmaceuticals, medical devices, diagnostics and related businesses by creating a collaborative environment that draws on the collective resources of industry, academia, government and other supporting organizations.



H-1B Technical Skills Training Project

The Chester County Economic Development Council (CCEDC) is completing the final quarter of the H-1B Incumbent Worker Training Grant, a 3 year, \$3 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration to support advanced information technology training for employees in information technology positions. Participating companies have provided a one-to-one match for each grant dollar bringing the total project amount to \$6 million.

As of December, 2006 approximately \$2.7 million dollars had been spent on training 1,350 incumbent and 39 dislocated American workers. More than 840 successful single outcomes, including employment, industry certifications, and wage increases and promotions related to the training have been reported. To date we have seen 670 wage increases, 78 promotions and 208 industry-recognized certifications. The H-1B Project will end on March 30, 2007.

Technology Development

CCEDC's Innovative Technology Action Group Works With Communication and Information Companies

The Innovative Technology Action Group, an initiative of the Chester County Economic Development Council, has changed its name, and expanded its services to serve Southeastern Pennsylvania. Established in 1999, as the Information Technology Action Group, the original ITAG mission targeted the workforce of the future by promoting technology careers to local high school and college students.

In 2006, ITAG expanded its vision to include communications technologies and was renamed the Innovative Technology Action Group. Currently, ITAG serves over 100 communications and information technology companies with a mission to create and sustain a regional partnership in Southeastern Pennsylvania that encourages technology companies and companies that use technology to grow their businesses in an increasingly sophisticated global marketplace.

ITAG has expanded regionally and is collaborating with the Workforce Investment Boards of Chester and Montgomery counties and the Delaware Valley Industrial Resource Center (DVIRC) along with the Economic Development Council. The organization has received \$650,000 in funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry to expand services to the region. ITAG recently allocated \$300,000 in grants to 31 companies for incumbent worker training.

ITAG's three major outreach projects are Girls Exploring Tomorrow's Technology (GETT), Techies Day, and TechTrek.

The ITAG Board is chaired by Diana Kimmich of Human Capital Management and Jim Lauckner of J*Lis Management Consulting.



Agricultural Economic Development

Agricultural Economic Development

Chester County Economic Development Council continued their partnership for a second year with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) on the PAgrows Program in 2006. The statewide program informs and assists farmers and other

agricultural businesses gain access to low-interest loan programs available from state and federal sources. The programs enable new and existing farmers to purchase land, construct new farm buildings, and purchase equipment and livestock.

Highlighting This Year's Milestones:

- CCEDC was integrally involved in 41 approved loan and loan guarantee projects totaling \$13.2 million in capital funding for agriculture.
- CCEDC responded to 136 new farmer contacts, in addition to ongoing prospects, resulting in the development of 45 loan structures and 47 referrals to Area Loan Organizations (ALOs).
- CCEDC organized a workshop on Agricultural Credit Analysis for ALOs that was held in January, 2006.

Overall, the Department of Community and Economic Development approved 161 First Industries – Agriculture loan projects since April, 2005 totaling over \$39 million in capital funding. CCEDC provided significant input to those loans through the PAgrows services. Those services included drafting sample loan structures, packaging and/or underwriting and submitting loan applications to the Department of Community and Economic Development, referrals to ALOs, follow-up with borrowers, lenders and ALOs, troubleshooting loan applications with the Department of Community and Economic Development, and facilitation of loan closings.

Community and Urban Redevelopment



CCEDC Launches Government and Municipal Service Initiative

As evidence of CCEDC's ongoing outreach to assist local communities throughout the County with their revitalization and development issues, the Chester County Economic Development Council has hired Tom McIntyre to fill the newly created position of Director of Government and Municipal Services. For the past 29 years, Tom was employed by the County of Chester, spending the last 13 years leading workforce development and

community development services as the Director of the Chester County Department of Community Development. As part of his duties with CCEDC, Tom will develop new contract and service opportunities with local municipalities, as well as manage certain municipal initiatives already established, such as those in Kennett Square, Oxford and Phoenixville described below.



Community Redevelopment Highlights

Kennett Square

Numerous state, local, and county officials were on hand March 16, 2006 to mark the grand opening of the Kennett Square Economic Development Services Center in the Genesis HealthCare building on State Street in the Borough. Designed to encourage and promote smart growth and prosperity in Kennett Square and in all of southern Chester County, the center offers a full suite of economic development services. Along with CCEDC, other partners involved in this project are the Southern Chester County Chamber of Commerce, Borough of Kennett Square, Historic Kennett Square, Genesis HealthCare, La Comunidad Hispania, the Kutztown University Small Business Development Center, the Chester County Bar Association, and a consortium of eleven local lending institutions.

Phoenixville

CCEDC and Chester County Industrial Development Authority were integrally involved in the continued revitalization efforts in Phoenixville. CCEDC, working in partnership with the Chester County Department of Community Development, administered a HUD 108 Loan that helped finance the Gateway Building, a new, 30,000 SF, Class A office building in the center of Phoenixville. Additionally, CCEDC worked to advance the Hankin Project at the Phoenixville Foundry, and CCEDC provided funding to conduct environmental assessments in the Phoenixville area.

Oxford

The Chester County Economic Development Council, along with the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission and the Chester County Foundation, provided financial support during 2006 which is enabling Oxford Mainstreet, Inc. and Oxford Borough to create a strategic vision for future economic development. Beginning in September 2006, a professional consultant team from Rettew was retained by Oxford to conduct a Town Center Feasibility Study. By the end of the year after exploring and gathering market information and logging critical data such as downtown infrastructure and building stock, the research and development stage of the project was complete. To generate the vision of the community and kick off the next stage of the project, the Borough will host a 3 day public charrette in January 2007. The final Feasibility Study is expected to be presented to the community in the spring of 2007, with an implementation strategy to follow.





Brownfields

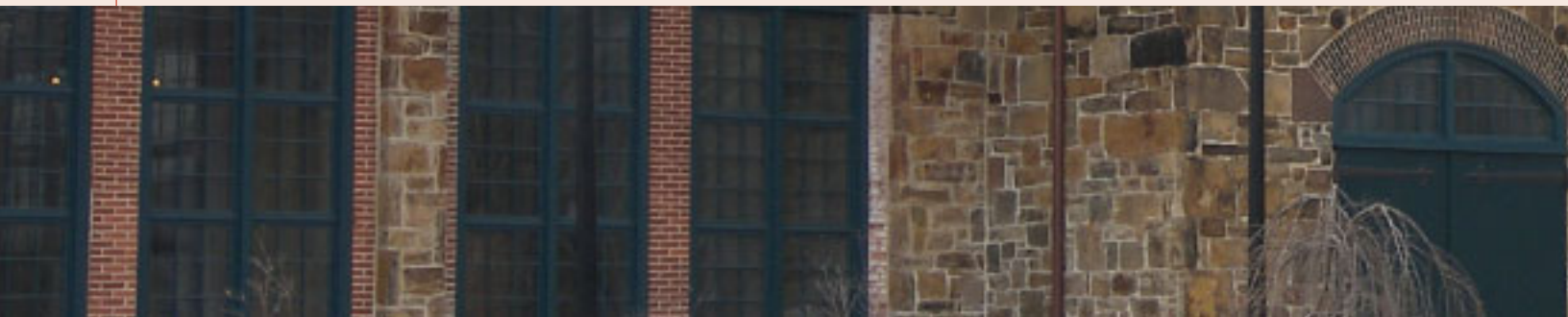
Moving Ahead with Assessments and Looking Forward to 2007

Following an extensive Request for Proposal (RFP) process, CCEDC selected three environmental firms to conduct brownfields assessments under a \$200,000 Brownfields Assessment Grant from the US EPA. Environmental Standards, Inc. of Valley Forge, ePhase, Inc. of West Chester, and Onesky Engineering, Inc. of Exton, were selected to perform Phase I and/or Phase II Environmental Site Assessments.

A total of four projects were funded through the US EPA grant in 2006: the Downtown Amtrak project, the Phoenixville Foundry project, the Public Safety Training Facility project, and the Spring City project.

Downtown Amtrak Project

Potential purchase of the 16.5 acre maintenance yard on the west side of the Borough. A Phase I assessment was pending at the end of 2006.



Revitalization of the train station and surrounding area will promote economic development, encourage re-investment throughout the Borough, and increase local public transit ridership and revenues.

Phoenixville Foundry Project

Final plans for the Hankin Group's redevelopment of the 13,000 historic Foundry Building are not complete; however, preliminary ideas include a venue for concerts, weddings, corporate events and other special events.

CCEDC funded the writing of a Sampling Analysis Plan in the Fall of 2006. Environmental Standards, Inc. will conduct the Phase II environmental site assessment in early 2007.

Public Safety Training Facility Project (PSTF)

In October 2006, CCEDC signed an agreement of sale with PECO to purchase a 70 acre parcel in East Fallowfield and South Coatesville. The parcel will serve as the site of the Chester County Public Safety Training Facility, a state of the art facility that will be designed to train Chester County's 5,000-

plus first responders including fire, police and emergency medical service personnel. CCEDC is working with Chester County and its Department of Emergency Services to implement this important project.

CCEDC began the due diligence process utilizing Advanced GeoServices Corporation and ePhase, Inc. for the Phase I environmental site assessment. ePhase, Inc. completed most of their research and site visit by the end of 2006. The Phase II environmental site assessment will be conducted in early 2007 by Advanced GeoServices Corporation.

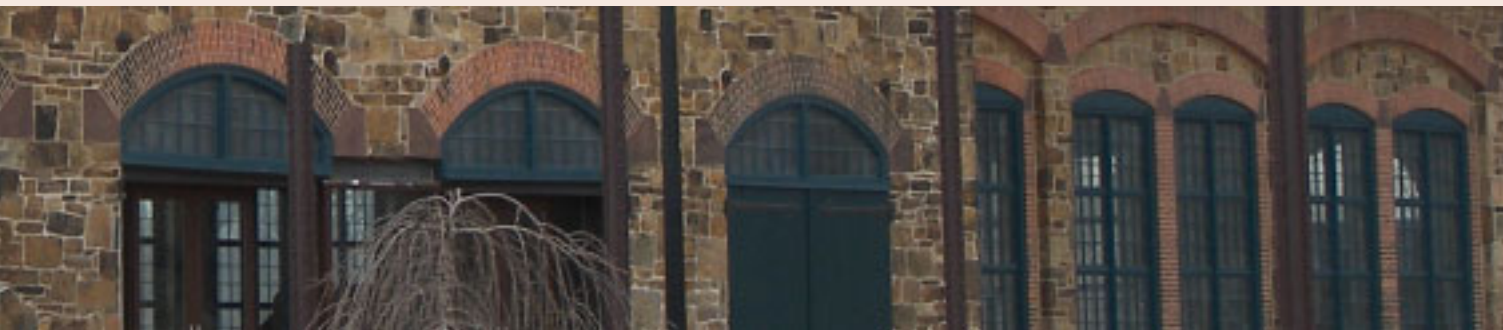
Spring City Project

CCEDC funded a Phase I environmental site assessment and the writing of a Sampling Analysis Plan for this project. Plans for this project include reusing the former site in the borough of Spring City as a commercial and residential venue.

Coatesville ISR Grant

CCEDC was awarded a \$200,000 Industrial Site Reuse (ISR) grant through the Commonwealth's Department of Community and Economic Development. The grant funding will be used to offset costs incurred by

Coatesville's Redevelopment Authority for environmental assessments conducted over the past few years on eight separate parcels in the area known as the "Flats."



ANRO, not your average printer

The evolution of ANRO Inc. continues. Established in 1953, the Chester County based company launched their business with a single typewriter; shortly thereafter, ANRO entered the commercial printing industry with the addition of a single hand-operated rotary press.

Today, ANRO boasts the best equipped conventional offset and digital pressrooms in the region, complimented by sophisticated mail, fulfillment, data and image management, and digital communication services.

ANRO adapted and changed during the intervening decades, adding new equipment and services guided by the needs of their customers (market leaders in the financial, pharmaceutical, telecommunication, manufacturing, retail, and education industries). Investments in new technologies are made with an eye towards helping clients communicate and cope with changes in their markets.

Digital technologies in particular play an ever more important role in the company's services. From managing data, graphic files, and imaging of conventional plates or directly to digital presses, digital technologies have a tremendous impact on the printing process here. But as impressive as the impact is on the quality and efficiencies of the printing process, the change in what can be done – the realm of possibilities – is even greater.

Creating personalized printed materials and direct mail pieces – not just names and addresses, but pictures and written content that is individually tailored, and consequently relevant to each recipient – is one example. The digital technologies at ANRO, however, go well beyond putting ink on

paper. Rather than end at the mailbox, ANRO helps clients extend their marketing campaigns to include email, cell phones, PDAs and the interactive benefits of the Internet.

By leveraging ANRO's digital communication services, companies can invite individuals to visit a webpage that's designed just for them (aka, a personalized landing page or PURL). When they visit their website, viewers can be surveyed and their responses, as well as any links they click, can be tracked and this information used to automatically generate dynamic email and text messages sent to their cell phones and PDAs.

For the consumer, dynamic content in email and text messages can include additional offers based on the information they provided online. Real-time messages can also be sent to the relevant marketing and sales personnel notifying them who, when and what was viewed online, prompting them for follow-up. Tracking reports can be viewed online as well to monitor campaign effectiveness and activity.

ANRO also develops and hosts custom print management websites. These are portals that enable organizations to fully leverage the benefits of all of the digital technologies in place at ANRO; for both printed collateral as well as direct mail and cross-media marketing campaigns.

The company has certainly evolved in the fifty-four year since their founding. While printing continues to provide the lion's share of their business to-date, ANRO has become a full-service graphic communications provider, with services and value that cannot be matched by traditional commercial printers and direct mail houses.
